HISTORY

Buffalo State opened its doors in 1871 as the Buffalo Normal School and has always focused on making quality education accessible to students while addressing the needs of the Western New York community. The college began by educating teachers, and later added undergraduate and graduate professional and liberal arts programs. Buffalo State joined the State University of New York (SUNY) in 1948.

Today Buffalo State is the largest of the four-year liberal arts colleges within the 64-campus SUNY system.

ACADEMICS

Buffalo State offers 140 undergraduate academic programs in the arts, sciences, education, and professional programs, including 11 honors options. There are many flexible minor, interdisciplinary, and special programs, including African and African American studies, “three-two” physics-engineering (in cooperation with SUNY’s Binghamton University and the University at Buffalo as well as Clarkson University) and women’s studies, as well as pre-professional advisement for law, medicine, sports medicine, and veterinary science.

The Graduate School offers 36 master’s programs, two certificate of advanced study (C.A.S.) programs, five graduate certificate programs, and 17 postbaccalaureate teacher certification programs. While teacher education programs remain very popular, graduate programs in adult education, applied economics, art conservation, creative studies, industrial technology, and student personnel administration are unique within SUNY. The C.A.S. programs are educational leadership and art conservation. The graduate certificate programs are adult education, museum studies, creativity and change leadership, and human resource development, and public management.

FACULTY

Teaching and learning are at the core of Buffalo State's mission. We take pride in our personal learning environment, with predominantly small classes taught by dedicated, highly qualified faculty, not graduate students. At Buffalo State, students come first, with 88 percent of all undergraduate classes having fewer than 40 students and classes for majors averaging 12 to 15 students. Most graduate classes have fewer than 15 students. While many of our 430 full-time faculty are recognized for their research or professional practice in their fields, their first priority is teaching. The Buffalo State faculty has been commended as a "major source of excellence" by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools, the national accrediting body since 1948. Forty-six faculty have won the prestigious SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching, and seven have been honored as SUNY Distinguished Teaching Professors. Eighty percent of our faculty hold the highest degree in their fields from such institutions as Carnegie Mellon, George Washington, Harvard, Johns Hopkins, Notre Dame, Stanford, and Yale.

STUDENTS

The only SUNY college located in a metropolitan area, Buffalo State offers educational, cultural, and recreational opportunities for its faculty, staff, and students. Our 11,234 students (9,371 undergraduates and 1,863 graduate students in fall 2008) enjoy the tremendous advantages at Buffalo State, both on the 125-acre campus and throughout the community. The incoming class comprises approximately 60 percent first-year (first-time) freshmen and 40 percent transfer students.

Buffalo State prides itself on the diversity of its student population—a reflection of today's society—with nontraditional students, students with disabilities, underrepresented minorities, students of many religions and ethnic backgrounds, and international students. More than 100 student organizations, facilitated by the Student Life Office, encourage students to participate in advocacy, cultural, ethnic, minority, academic, fraternity/sorority, leadership, professional, religious, sports, and recreation organizations. This diversity allows students to learn, play, and grow in a supportive environment where differences among individuals are appreciated. **Opportunities are available for faculty as advisers to these organizations.**

TEACHING, RESEARCH, AND SCHOLARSHIP

The college sponsors numerous activities to further enhance excellence in the classroom and state-of-the-art pedagogy. In 1998, Buffalo State began working with the prestigious Carnegie Academy for the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (CASTL). (See page 5.2.) CASTL is composed of campuses that have assumed leadership roles in providing support and a forum for fostering learning for all students as well as research into the practice and profession of teaching. The Buffalo State advisory committee works to establish policies and initiate campus activities that recognize and reward faculty and staff who advance the college mission to provide "excellence in teaching and scholarship." The State Education Department is the administrative agency of the Regents of the University of the State of New York. The Regents, established by the New York State Legislature in 1784 and further provided for by the New York State Constitution, form the oldest continuous state education entity in the United States. The Regents are responsible for the general supervision of all educational activities within the state, presiding over the university and the New York State Education Department. The Regents are organized into standing committees and subcommittees whose members and chairs are appointed by the chancellor.

The Board of Regents comprises 17 members elected by the State Legislature for five-year terms. Regents are unsalaried and are reimbursed only for travel and related expenses in connection with their official duties.

The concept of the University of the State of New York is a broad term encompassing all the institutions, both public and private, offering education in New York State. The University of the State of New York is the nation's most comprehensive and unified educational system. It consists of all elementary, secondary, and post-secondary educational institutions; libraries; museums; public broadcasting; records and archives; professions; Vocational and Educational Services for Individuals with Disabilities; and such other institutions, organizations, and agencies as may be admitted to the university.

SUNY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees is the governing body of SUNY. The board consists of 17 members, 15 of whom are appointed by the governor, by and with consent of the New York State Senate. In addition, the president of the Student Assembly serves as student

trustee and the president of the University Faculty Senate serves as an ex-officio trustee. Among the authorities of the Board of Trustees is the power to:

- Appoint its own officers, the chancellor, and System Administration senior staff.
- Appoint the president of each state-operated institution, and approve the appointment of statutory and community college presidents by their respective boards.
- Grant all degrees, diplomas, and certificates for the completion of studies at any state-operated campus, including honorary degrees.
- Regulate the admission of students and prescribe qualifications for their continued attendance.
- Regulate tuition, fees and charges, curricula, and all other matters pertaining to the operation and administration of each state-operated campus.
- Establish new campuses.

Community colleges have local boards of trustees whose relationships to the SUNY board are determined by law.

STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK

The State University of New York (SUNY) was established by act of the 1948 Legislature as a corporate entity in the State Education Department under the Board of Regents. Today SUNY is a statewide system of 64 campuses, enrolling 438,000 students supported by some 32,500 faculty. It is the largest, most diverse multi-campus university in the nation. SUNY is committed to bringing its students the best and brightest faculty, and the promise of a caring learning environment. State assistance keeps SUNY tuition much lower than rates charged at private colleges and universities. The university's motto is "To Learn —To Search —To Serve."

The 64 campuses include four university centers, 13 university colleges, four centers of the health sciences, six colleges of technology, four specialized colleges, 30 community colleges, and five statutory colleges on the campuses of private universities. The Board of Trustees directly determines the policies to be followed by the 34 state-supported campuses. The 30 community colleges have their own local boards of trustees whose

relationships to the State University Board are defined by law. System Administration is located in State University Plaza, Albany.

SUNY SYSTEM ADMINISTRATION

The chancellor of the State University of New York is the chief administrative officer of the 64-campus SUNY system and is responsible for developing and implementing policies approved by the SUNY Board of Trustees. The Provost's Office provides academic leadership to SUNY in the pursuit of excellence, drawing on the strengths of its campuses and the potential inherent within a system. The chancellor and senior administrators are headquartered at State University Plaza, Albany.

According to New York State Education Law, Sec. 356, Councils of State-Operated Institutions; Powers and Duties, the operations and affairs of each state-operated institution of the state university, other than the state institutes of applied arts and sciences, shall be supervised locally by a council consisting of nine members appointed by the governor. Initial appointments are for seven-year terms. Also, one student member, duly elected by the student body, is appointed each year. Members receive no compensation for their services but are reimbursed for the expenses actually and necessarily incurred in performing their duties. The chief administrative officer of Buffalo State is the president. Appointed by the Board of Trustees upon recommendation by the Buffalo State College Council and the chancellor, the president serves at the pleasure of the trustees. The chancellor, upon recommendation of the president, appoints all college administrative officers.

The college is organized under the President's Office and its vice presidential areas. The vice presidential area of Academic and Student Affairs comprises four undergraduate schools, the Graduate School, University College, and the vice presidential area of Student Affairs. Each school is headed by a dean who reports to the provost and vice president for academic and student affairs. They are the School of Arts and Humanities, the School of Education, the School of Natural and Social Sciences, and the School of the Professions. The dean of the Graduate School and the dean of University College also report to the provost.

Members of the academic staff in charge of academic departments or divisions are designated as chairs in addition to their academic ranks. Chairs are designated for renewable periods of up to three years by the president after consultation with appropriate faculty including the department or division concerned.

COLLEGE SENATE

The College Senate is the official agency through which the faculty, staff, and students engage in the governance of the college. Its actions are advisory to the president of the college and focus on curriculum, faculty and staff welfare, instruction and research, standards for students, bylaws and elections, budget and staff allocations, student welfare, and academic plan. Each of these topical areas is the focus of a standing committee of the College Senate, each with broad representation of the college community. Interest in committee service is welcomed, with information made available each spring/summer.

The Senate is a broad-based body, composed of administrators (college president, non-voting; provost, non-voting; vice president of Academic and Student Affairs ex-officio, non-voting; vice president for Finance and Management ex-officio), faculty and staff (seven at-large members of the faculty and professional staff, six members of the professional staff, six faculty members from each of the four academic schools, one member from the support staff, one faculty member from the library), 12 students, two elected university faculty senators (representing Buffalo State on the University Faculty Senate), and two non-voting members appointed by the college president.

College Senate meetings are held at 3:00 p.m. on Friday once a month during the academic year and are open to all. The schedule is posted on the College Senate Web site. Meetings are announced in the weekly *Bulletin, Daily* e-mail, and the events calendar on the college Web site. Approved meeting minutes and information shared at each meeting are posted on the College Senate Web site.
