The Buffalo State College Child Care Center is located on campus in the Buckham Campus School (Campus West). The center primarily serves children of Buffalo State students and employees and is open year round for babies and children between the ages of six weeks and 5 years, offering a sliding fee based on household income. At times, there may be a waiting period for enrollment of children in certain age groups.

The Child Care Center also offers a summer school-age program for children ages 5 to 12 years. The center provides a safe, fun environment for each child to develop his or her social, emotional, cognitive, and physical abilities. It offers a developmentally appropriate program with a reputation for excellence.

The Buffalo State College Child Care Center is licensed by the New York State Office of Children and Family Services, is accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children, and is the proud recipient of the Child Care Coalition of the Niagara Frontier's 1999 Program of the Year Award. Albright-Knox Art Gallery

The Albright-Knox Art Gallery, located on Elmwood Avenue directly across from Buffalo State, enjoys a worldwide reputation as an outstanding center of modern art. Its collection has been cited as “one of the world's top international surveys of contemporary painting and sculpture” and is especially rich in post-war American and European art, acquired through the generosity of its patron, the late Seymour H. Knox. Abstract expressionism, pop art, and art of the 1970s through the end of the century are well represented by exceptional examples.

Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society

Founded in 1862, the Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society is one of the oldest regional historical societies in the country and the largest in Western New York. It preserves more than 100,000 artifacts documenting the cultural heritage of the region. The Research Library cares for more than 20,000 books, 200,000 photographs, and 2,000 manuscript collections. It also is a major repository of genealogical research materials. The museum hosts temporary and permanent exhibitions that illustrate the rich tapestry that reflects the history of this area. Tours, workshops, lectures, educational programming for adults and children, and periodic publications augment its exhibition schedule.

Burchfield-Penney Art Center

The new Burchfield-Penney Art Center at Buffalo State opened to public on November 22, 2008. The new 84,000 square foot, \$35 million museum is located on the corner of Elmwood Avenue and Rockwell Road and is the only museum dedicated to the art and artists of Western New York. The Burchfield-Penney Art Center's collections consist of more than 7,500 works of art and thousands of archival files representing the work of almost 600 artists. The museum is home to the largest public collection of works by Charles E. Burchfield (1893-1967), with more than 95 paintings plus 25,000 drawings and sketches, in addition to the country's most comprehensive archives about his art and career. Western New York artists represented in the museum's collections, in addition to Burchfield, include Elbert Hubbard, Gustav Stickley, Karl Kipp, Frank Lloyd Wright, Edwin Dickinson, Milton Rogovin, Marion Faller, Susan Rothenberg, Joseph Piccillo, Cindy Sherman, Robert Longo, Alberto Rey, and Paul Sharits, to name just a few. The new museum is certified to the silver level by the U.S. Green Building Council, making it the first "green" museum in New York State.

Museum hours are Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday, 10:00 a.m.–5:00 p.m.; Thursday, 10:00 a.m. –9:00 p.m.; and Sunday 1:00–5:00 p.m.

Great Lakes Center

The Great Lakes Center (GLC) is a multidisciplinary research, education, and service institute with a primary focus on the Great Lakes. The center is committed to providing the best possible science for understanding the physical, chemical, biological, and social dimensions of the Great Lakes and their watersheds. Proper stewardship of the Great Lakes system requires transdisciplinary research approaches to understand fully its complex dynamics, community outreach to promote understanding of the system, and educating future generations. The GLC brings together faculty from academic departments with particular emphasis on the specialties of aquatic ecology, fisheries, watershed hydrology, water quality, environmental toxicology and chemistry, urban ecology, and environmental education. In addition, the GLC actively promotes collaborative research with other academic and research institutions in the United States, Canada, Europe, and South America, and is

a member of the Great Lakes Research Consortium. Students experience hands-on training in environmental science.

Facilities include on- and off-campus space to support high-quality research in a variety of disciplines, promote rigorous graduate and undergraduate education, and facilitate research dissemination to the public. GLC Facilities include state-of-the-art laboratories at the field station on Lake Erie; a fleet of research vessels capable of operating in the open Great Lakes and their contributing waters; a demonstration watershed for research and teaching; environmental toxicology, aquatic ecology, and watershed laboratories on the Buffalo State College campus; and a variety of sampling and analytical equipment to support the research and educational missions.

Performing Arts Center at Buffalo State

The Performing Arts Center (PAC) at Rockwell Hall is a resource for both Buffalo State and the community, serving as a vital link between the college and its metropolitan surroundings. The PAC has become one of the most active and popular venues for the performing arts in Buffalo. The contemporary 856-seat theater has hosted a spectacular array of performers from around the world, adding depth and variety to the cultural fabric of the college and the Western New York community.

The PAC staff offers support services to college departments and many community organizations. The PAC presents the Great Performers Series, which features world-class performing artists in the intimacy of the center. The Artsplorations series is an innovative series of live performances for Western New York schoolchildren. The Whitworth Ferguson Planetarium is a unique Buffalo State resource for the Western New York community. Students studying astronomy have the opportunity to use the planetarium as a laboratory. They assist in maintaining, improving, and operating the equipment and in developing presentations about the planets, stars, and constellations. The planetarium schedules a number of public shows and programs during each school year and also arranges educational programs attended by thousands of area schoolchildren and adults annually. The campus community is invited to attend these shows as space permits.
